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

- NEW SCHOOLS fairly cat up money when it comes to maintenance costs. This is a fact of which the Ministry of Education must be depressingly aware.
- tt is one of the more unpleasant facts of Government economics that our gleaming new schools, with their Impressive walls of glass and their satin-chrome fittings, wear nothing like as well as their Victorian predecesses edecessors
- predecessors. But Essex County Council still seem to be under the delusion that modern schools can be run as cheaply as the old ones. This week comes the news that Basildon Education Committee are short of £60,000 to maintain and improve their schools this year. The County Council have refused to pay up. Regardless of what one may think of the new-look schools as opposed to the old ones, the fact remains that Basildon—In common with other new development areas—is stuck with many new schools. To fail to maintain them adequately is false economy. But this is what is already happening.

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


ALL MY PREVIOUS ARTICLES in this scries have been designed to assist those who are hoping to buy a home for their own occupation. This time I want to discuss (very briefly, since it is a vast subject) the possibility of buying property purely for investment.

Basically there are two ways to invest your money in residential property. If you are able to buy a rather allapidated house at a reasonably low price it may be possible to spend some money on putting it into good order and then reselling it at a profit. This type of speculation is very risky indeed and unless you are an expert or can call upon expert help it is best left wellalone. Apartfrom the original cost of the house and the renova-tions there will allo be various professional charges involved in the sale and purchase. Since you are also llable to a heavy capital gains tax on the profit it could well be that the game may not be worth the candle and you might end up in the red. A much safer proposi-tion (although still hazardous unless you know what you are doing) is to invest your capital in a property for mor faits — the more self-contained each flat will command. Almost without exception, rents are now subject to some kind of control. 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
