Ten thousand dress-and-coat sets for Russia from Basildon

And no dowdy colours!

TEN THOUSAND dress-and-coat sets have been ordered from a Basildon firm—Julian Jerseywear—as part of a £1M. Russian deal with the Selincourt Group.

Three factories—at Harold Hill, Romford and Basildon—are involved in the £1M. order for three-piece suits and dress-and-coat sets.

"We are very pleased about it," said Julian Jerseywear manageress Mrs. Iris Gibson. "It is good for everyone, including the girls. They will get a good run of work on top of the normal orders, and, as a good deal of it is for the same type of clothes, they should get very fast at it."

The dress-and-coat sets will be in jerseywear and in polyester fibre. "Russian suits seem to be about the same as ours," said Mrs. Gibson. "But the colours they have chosen include some very bright ones—nothing dowdy about them."

Work will start on the order in mid-April for delivery from June to September.

Julian Jerseywear have been in Basildon for five years and now have two factory bays in Bowlers Croft. They have 120 employees, working mainly for mail-order firms.

Government cut hits our schools

£60,000 worth of urgent work
is held up

SLASHING OF ESTIMATES BY THE COUNTY AND A REJECTION OF A 10 PER CENT QUOTA INCREASE BY THE GOVERNMENT MEANS THAT OVER £60,000 WORTH OF URGENT WORK IN BASILDON'S SCHOOLS CANNOT BE CARRIED OUT NEXT YEAR.

As a result of the money shortage only 2 per cent of the expenditure will go on "essential improvements," and most of that to new schools.

This was pointed out by Headmaster Mr. J. J. Wilson at Wednesday's Basildon Education Committee meeting. "It does not make sense that only one old school is included in the list," he said. "How long can we go on not making improvements to these schools?"

Chairman Coun. G. T. Field said the allocation from the County this year amounted to £44,935 for primary schools and £34,720 for secondary schools. Routine repairs would take £50,000 of this.

All that was left to spend on routine maintenance and improvements was £16,135 for primary schools and £9,420 for secondary schools.

"Last year we made strong representations to the County for an increase in grant to allow us to carry out a 10-year programme of work."

The County did, in fact, agree to increase our quota by 10 per cent, but the Government put the squeeze on and we are left with exactly the same amount as last year,"

said Coun. Field.

"The root of all the trouble is the new schools," said Coun. A. V. Stockley, who suggested that permission should be sought from the County for the Council's architects to make a start by designing a school for Basildon.

"I'm sure they would make a better job of it," he said. "Going round the schools it is easy to see where priorities have gone wrong. Some have fine wooden floors yet the windows do not shut properly."

Coun. A. T. Dove supported the idea. "Woodlands School is a perfect example," he said. "It was jerry built and we have had to spend thousands putting it right."

Chairman of the Works and Supplies Committee Coun. Derrick Pope said the financial problem was very grave. "The County cut down on costs when they build these schools and we have to foot the bill for maintenance."

From the chair, Coun.

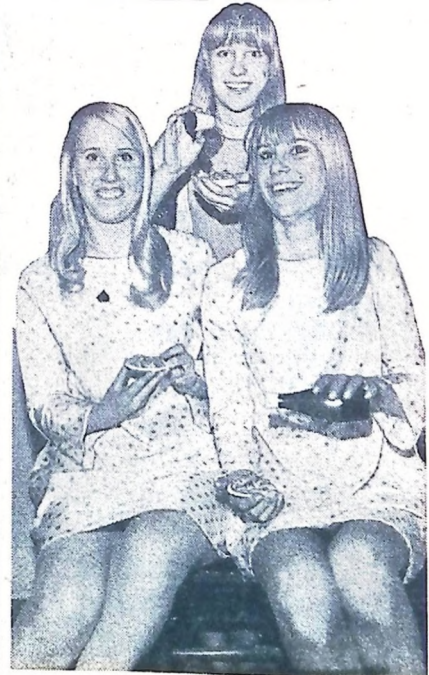
Field assured the Committee that he would look into the possibility of the Council's architects being brought in to design a school.

After the meeting Coun. Pope said: "We had over £80,000 worth of work being called for in our schools yet we had to cut this down to £25,000."

"All the items were reasonable, but we could only select those which were really urgent."

"Iolanthe" is an outstanding production at Billericay

IT WAS with some misgivings that I took a seat at the Archer Hall, Billericay, on Tuesday night to watch the curtain go up on Billericay Amateur Operatic Society's presentation of Gilbert and Sullivan's "Iolanthe," writes GREGORY BARNES.

Not being a great fan of light opera, the prospect of having to sit through a two-hour long performance of this kind was not exciting.

But those two hours on Tuesday night would have converted anybody into a fan of the Operatic Society, and from now on, "Iolanthe" will always remain a firm favourite with me.

Neither the cast nor the orchestra flagged throughout the performance, which featured three members of the Society's original cast when they produced it for the first time in 1942.

Produced by Ron Westlake, with Charles Weston as Musical Director, "Iolanthe" is described as a "conspicuously successful work, making fun of both stage convention and British political life."

The satire is wound around a complex love story—a young shepherd, who is the son of a fairy, "Iolanthe," falls in love with a Ward in Chancery, who is revered by all the peers in Parliament. The Lord Chancellor, however, refuses her permission to marry a complex as the Noble House of Peers is forced to

her to have riches and a title—and the story tells how the shepherd competes against the peers for the hand of his lover.

Strephon, the fairy's son of course, has unusual advantages over his rivals as he is half a fairy—but being a fairy down to his waist with mortal legs, has its problems!

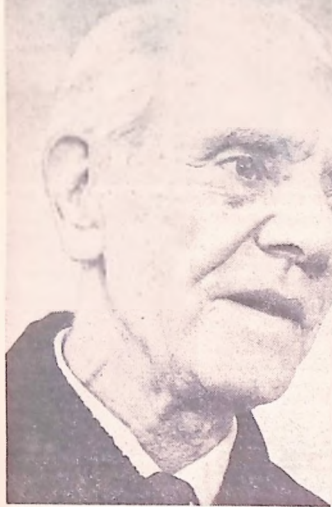

HE PRESIDES OVER THE TEAPOT!

IF THERE IS ONE THING THAT MEMBERS OF THE THURSDAY CLUB DO LOOK FORWARD TO, IT IS A NICE CUP OF TEA AT THEIR WEEKLY MEETING. SEEING THAT THEY GET IT IS MR. HENRY STEADMAN (75), WHO HAS BEEN PRESIDING OVER THEIR TEAPOT NOW FOR THE PAST THREE YEARS.

Mr. Steadman (seen above) has suffered from the serious handicap of deafness for 70 of his 75 years, and now he fears that it is getting worse. Nevertheless, he makes friends with many people, and is always willing to lend a hand wherever he can.

One thing that gives him pleasure is writing poems. All sorts of little jingles come from his pen, mostly about everyday happenings, and some of his children's poems have been taught to the children in the local day-nursery.

Another of his pleasures is gardening, an impending operation prevents him doing anything heavy, like digging, for the time being.

He was born in Bethnal Green, and lived there for all his younger life. His very first job was an "after-school" task—he was latter boy at a nearby barber's shop, where he worked every night after school, from 5 till about 8 p.m.

One of his customers was a Policeman, who weighed 16 stone, and was 6ft. three inches in his socks. To latter him, young Henry was provided with a stool, on which he had to climb to reach the other side of his huge customer's face! After the Policeman's hair had been cut, he would pick up Henry and stand him on a form, so that he could reach to brush his clothes, and, afterwards, he would lift him down again.

Henry's first full-time employment was with Allen and Hanbury's Bethnal Green factory. He delivered chemicals all over London with a horse and van.

Quite near to him lived a girl, who was visited regularly by a friend of her own age. After a time, however, it was Henry she came to visit, and, in 1916, they were married. At the time he was a private in the 10th Essex Regiment.

When unemployment had its grip on the country after the war, Henry took a job in the publishing department of a newspaper. He had no previous knowledge of the work, but was glad to start at the bottom and learn the business. He joined the staff of the "Daily Herald," and was there for 27 years.

Now he lives quietly with his wife at South Green, Billericay. They both love the peace and beauty of the district. After the bustle and dirt of London's East End, they have a daughter and two grandchildren, one of whom is at the University of Essex.

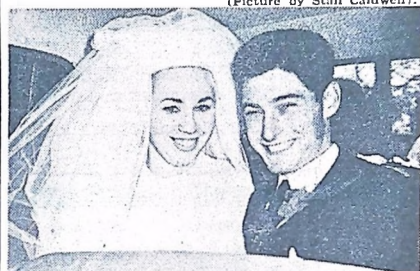

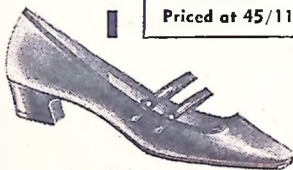

CORPORATION GENERAL Manager Mr. R. C. C. Boniface has denied making an agreement with Basildon Christian Council over churches for "unorthodox religions" like Jehovah's Witnesses.

Christian Council Secretary Mr. Walter Searl has also denied there is an agreement—but insists there is an understanding that he will be told of plans by these groups to build in the New Town.

The Corporation denial follows a report in this paper of last month's Christian Council meeting. Mr. Searl was quoted as saying that sites for churches would not be given to these groups until after the Christian Council had been informed.

"With my trust in officialdom I asked for that in writing," Mr. Searl told the meeting last month.

This was not retracted by Mr. Searl or any other Christian Council officer after the report appeared. About 30 ministers and church representatives were at the meeting. None were complaining. Mr. Searl had been incorrectly quoted.

Mr. Ken Shales, of Braybrooke, Basildon, asked local M.P. Mr. Eric Moonman to look into the matter.

In a letter to Mr. Shales Mr. Boniface described this paper's report as "totally untrue." He went on: "Before I could take up with Mr. Searl whether he had been accurately reported I had a letter from him denying he made the statement attributed to him and apologising for any inconvenience he might have caused me."

The reported "agreement" was also criticised by Jehovah's Witness Mr. Reg Judge, of Grange Road, Runwell, whose letter was printed in this paper. His letter was mentioned by Mr. Boniface in the reply to Mr. Shales: "Let me make it quite clear that no such agreement as suggested by Mr. Judge has been made by or on behalf of the Corporation."

And Mr. Searl also wrote to Mr. Judge saying "there is nothing improper in the attitude between this Council and the Corporation."

He told Mr. Judge that all the Christian Council asked for was to be advised of applications from groups not covered by a County committee which considers allocation of church sites. He stresses there is no barrier to other religious groups coming to Basildon.

Local Jehovah's Witnesses are worried about the outlook of the Christian Council towards them. One told a reporter they still look back on the number of years it took to get permission to build a Kingdom Hall on Laindon Link.

"They wonder why planning permission was so long in coming. 'So far as we are concerned,' the Witness added, 'it does not matter two hoots whether they build a church or chapel right next door to one of our halls as this is a free country.'

"Hitler, Mussolini and the Communist lands have all tried to destroy Jehovah's Witnesses, but the more the persecution—the greater the increase and success of the work underground."

Speaking to a reporter, Mr. Searl clarified the Christian Council view this week. About the report he remarked: "I was angry at the time, as you gave it a slant that wasn't true."

He said the Jehovah's Witnesses and Mormons were not represented on the Essex Churches Reconstruction Committee or on Basildon Christian Council. All the Christian Council asked, he said, was for them to be told if other groups had plans to build near their churches. Mr. Searl emphasised this would apply to his

own Dry Street Interdenominational Church when they looked for a new site.

"It is just a sensible arrangement to avoid duplication," he said.

"There is no question of trying to stop them. It is only so that there is a decent gap between churches. But the Jehovah's Witnesses and Mormons won't co-operate in any way with existing churches. This has happened in Basildon."

Ladies' Club formed

THE INAUGURAL meeting of Ghyllgrove Ladies' Club at Ghyllgrove Community Centre on Thursday week was attended by twelve women, whose first job was to pick a committee.

Officers elected were: Mrs. J. McPherson, Chairman; Mrs. D. Jones, Secretary; Mrs. M. Cross, Treasurer. They hope to recruit more members to future meetings so that they can engage various speakers, who insist on a certain attendance before their services can be booked.

Members will take it in turns to keep the children amused while their mothers enjoy the Club's activities.

A talk from a clinic worker and a fashion show are planned.

No cuppa at Basildon on Sundays?

MRS. M. R. Prentice has a grievance against Basildon. Although she and her husband now live at they pay regular visits to in and around Basildon.

In a letter to the Council, Mrs. Prentice complains of the complete lack of a restaurant or cafe in the Town Centre which opens on Sunday.

She writes:—"...our intention was to lunch out before visiting friends, and to look around our shops. We certainly tired ourselves out looking for restaurants; these I might add were very few, and not one was open. There wasn't even a small cafe open where we could have a nice cup of tea."

Mrs. Prentice goes on:—"Of course the public houses were open, and, having scanned the menu outside... we went in, only to be told that the restaurant was closed!"

"The only comfort we gained from our visit was to sit quietly in St. Martin's Church and rest our tired feet. These doors were open to us, thank goodness. If the occasion arises again, we shall either lunch at home or visit one of the delightful restaurants in and around Leigh-on-Sea."

A DREAM WILL SOON BECOME TRUE!

THE 4th Billericay Scout Group's dream of someday owning their very own headquarters is soon to become reality.

Over the last few years the Group have raised all but £75 of the £2,500 needed to pay for a suitable building, and they are hoping to raise the remainder at a spring fayre in Billericay High Street tomorrow (Saturday).

A plot of land next to the Billericay Air Training Corps Squadron's new headquarters has been set aside for the Scout hut by Basildon Council, and the sectional cedarwood building, 6ft. long and 30ft wide, will be constructed over a period of about six months, starting in April or May.

Construction of the base and service road and the electrical, plumbing and drainage work will be put out to contract, but the Scouts themselves, helped by their parents and supervised by experts, will be responsible for erecting the actual building.

Three years ago the Group were nearly forced to disband for the want of a meeting place, and at the moment they have to share a small hall adjoining the Roman Catholic Church in Laindon Road with another group.

"Our present facilities are very inadequate for a group of our size," Group Parents' Committee Vice-Chairman Mr. John Harvey told the "Standard" this week. The Building Sub-Committee are seen above.

"We have 35 Cubs, 30 Scouts, 10 Senior Scouts and a waiting list of 30 who want to enter as Cubs, but until we get our new building we can't accommodate them all."

"The new premises will enable us to have extra meetings and carry on more Scouting activities because we will be able to store our equipment on the spot instead of having it scattered throughout a number of houses and garages as it is now."

Mr. Smith is an enthusiastic breeder of Border canaries and, although he has only kept birds of his own for the past six years, he has always been interested in them and

'The BEST NEWS you ever heard'

WHAT is the best news you ever heard? Perhaps when you heard you had won some money or when you were told a loved-one was safe after an accident, or when you learnt you had passed an examination, or perhaps when the one you loved most agreed to marry you. Good news though all of these were, there is better news still in the message of Good Friday and Easter.

The marvelous truth of this season is that God never stops loving us, that no matter how bad we are He will still forgive, that these arch-enemies of ours — suffering, sin and death — have no power to really hurt us any more because Christ has triumphed over them all. These are no trivial things; these are the great problems of life to which our Christian religion gives us an answer.

But "It ain't necessarily so," as the song says. Who says these things are true? What is the evidence? Are these not just truths that Christians have fostered to keep themselves in business?

The truth is that the Death and Resurrection of Jesus are two of the best attested events of the whole of history. What is the evidence?

Firstly that of the Bible. Here we must remember that the New Testament books contain the words of men of integrity who staked their credit and their lives on the fact of the Death and Resurrection. They were absolutely certain

because they had actually seen Him, or because they knew someone else who had, that Jesus was alive after death. Against their absolute conviction all attempts to explain away the Death and Resurrection of Christ fall miserably. Reading the Bible there is no doubt that these men were convinced of Christ's triumph and that it was the best news in the world for them.

Secondly there is the evidence of history. There are numerous references in the annals of the early centuries to support the existence of a Christian sect and to describe its customs. Many of these customs, for example the Holy Communion, had their origin in the essential conviction that Christ died and was risen again and that He was with all Christians.

Historically, too, we must take into account why Sunday has, ever since early Christian times, been the great day of the week. The Jews kept their Sabbath (our Saturday); the Christians took another day, Sunday, in perpetual memory of the Resurrection of Jesus.



Thirdly in our evidence we must consider the Church. By this we mean God's people, still working away in the world nearly 2000 years after the original Gospel events and yet still convinced of God's victory. Down the centuries the enemies of the Gospel have often tried to destroy the Church by physical and intellectual force. They have never completely triumphed because you cannot destroy Christ, who is in the Church, the companion of all its members. If the Church had just been man-made it would surely have perished long ago; we believe the proof of the Resurrection is the presence of the Church.

Fourthly there is the personal experience of individual Christians in every age, and not least in our own. The certainty of the living presence of Jesus has strengthened

Christians in prison camps facing death, in hospitals critically ill, in lonely places far from home, as well as in the daily round and common task. The assurance of this love is enough to strengthen the weakest.

So there is the evidence, but of course it does not convince everyone just like that. If you are just not interested in the whole business you cannot expect that the evidence will convince you in a moment and turn you into an ardent Christian. Unless we are trying to love and please God, our Lord cannot make himself clear to us. Jesus said: "If a man love me, he will keep my word and My Father will love him and We will come unto him and make an abode with him." This means that if we are trying to find God He will come to our aid and make His presence known to us.

The greatest need at Easter-tide (and all the rest of the year) is simply to remember that Christ is the Living God. We do not have to conjure up Christ. He is already here, there and everywhere.

Dare to act on that truth and you will find it makes all the difference. His presence is with us still. This knowledge of His friendship transforms our life and means we can face life or death without fear.

In this knowledge we wish you the happiest of Easters and offer you the best news you have ever heard.

NORTH SEA GAS seems to be spelling success for a good many British businessmen. One firm hoping to cash in on the discovery are Quadmaties, Ltd., of Basildon, who deal in steel fabrications and handling equipment.

One of their latest orders is for part of the plant which will be installed at Hull to receive the natural gas when it is piped ashore.

But, he believes, the Government have it in their power to put the steel industry at going again. "Restrictions have to be lifted by the Government to get the industry going again. We play a major part in the country's economics."

Six men—welders and platers—work at Quadmaties' factory in Bowlers Croft and some have included a British Rail hit shaft for their Newcastle depot and a 30cwt. water tank for the Barking depot.

THE TIMBER WHARF and sawmill on the south side of the A13 has been in existence since the early nineteen-twenties, and has developed over the years to its present eight acres. Softwood from Europe and America is imported via two wharves in London belonging to W. C. Ware, the parent company of Farquharson (Vange) Limited. Small cargoes are brought into Southend and then by road to Vange. Handling at the wharf is by modern front-fork lifts and sideloaders, this being essential for fast movement of timber as the storage area now holds 300,000 cubic feet of timber.

NEW SAWMILL

The present mill was built in 1928 and is to be replaced later this year by a modern sawmill designed for milling large quantities of timber to flooring and mouldings. This sawmill will eventually incorporate automatically-fed saws and planing machines of the most modern design. Western red cedar, parana pine and Douglas fir are a speciality of the Company and these decorative timbers can be machined to any pattern.

The bulk of the timber leaving Vange Wharf is destined for the building trade, but small orders are accepted and a daily delivery service is in operation. For the large consumer timber can be delivered on lorries which have cranes fitted for fast unloading at site or factory. The whole point of development and mechanisation at Vange is to give the customer a prompt service.

THIS RATHER jolly "typewriter picture" was found for us this week by our old friend Uncle Bas. It's most effective, isn't it? I thought you might like to see it, as it is nearly Boat Race Day again. This year it will be held on Easter Saturday, March 25th.

We've had a Boat Race now every year since 1856, although it was actually instituted in 1829. It takes place on a course on the Thames that runs from Putney to Mortlake, which is a distance of about 4½ miles—or if you are one of those absolute sticklers for exact measurements, it is four miles, one furlong, 180 yards! (Or so it says in a very fat book in the public library!).

Up to this year Cambridge have won the race 60 times, Oxford have had 48 wins, and there has been one dead-heat, way back in 1877. In 1859 Cambridge sank and Oxford won; in 1912 they both sank—but Oxford won the row.

In 1925, Oxford sank and Cambridge paddled home and, in 1951, Oxford sank after the first half-mile and the race was abandoned owing to the weather and rowing conditions. Cambridge won the row.

Cambridge set up a sequence of victories that lasted 13 years. Poor old Oxford must have thought they would never get a look-in, mustn't they?

During World War II the Boat Race did not take place, but they had substitute races, which were rowed at Henley and Ely.

When I was a girl at school, we paid a lot more attention to the Boat Race than seems to be the case today. Of course, there was no television film of it then! We all went Boat-Race-mad, and were huge fans of dark blue favours, to show which crew we were hoping

would win, and many enthusiastic supporters came to wordy battles over the possible results. Those of us who went to school by train used to divide naturally into Oxford and Cambridge teams, and Oxford would never dream of getting into a Cambridge carriage, or vice versa! Weren't we silly? But we took it all terribly seriously!

And, anyone who actually got taken to watch the event itself was a real heroine for weeks afterwards, and would "swank" horribly all over the school.

SOUTHEAST WATERWORKS COMPANY

MR. P. E. BRASSEY'S STATEMENT

The Annual General Meeting of the Southeast Waterworks Company was held on March 16, 1967, in London, the Hon. P. E. Brassey, D.L., J.P. (the Chairman), presiding. The following is his Statement circulated with the Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended December 31, 1966.

It has always been your Directors' policy to keep charges at a level which will ensure an adequate water supply coupled with an efficient consumer service. The decision to increase charges as from July 1 last year gave your Board considerable regret and especially so as the Company's charge for metered water had remained unchanged since 1960, when it was, in fact, reduced, and the domestic rate has remained unaltered since 1958 apart from an adjustment following the revaluation of properties in 1963.

The principal factors which made the increase necessary were the bulk supply of water from Metropolitan Water Board, additional works to receive and distribute this water and the provisions of the Finance Act, 1965.

ACCOUNTS

As was anticipated by your Directors, the Company operated at a substantial deficit for the year of £52,465. However, the scale of charges to consumers now in operation should ensure a working surplus in 1967.

Under the provisions of the Finance Act 1965, there is now a liability to account to the Inland Revenue for income tax deducted from dividends, which in the past has been retained by the Company. For the first three years — 1966, 1967 and 1968 — your Company will receive the assistance provided in Section 86 of the Finance Act 1965, towards this additional taxation liability. In 1966 this is provisionally agreed at £31,908, but will be a lesser figure in the future.

All operating and administration costs have increased due to a greater quantity of water supplied, rises in the costs of materials, wages, salaries and other expenses including Rates Payable to Local Authorities and a large volume of maintenance work arising from the expansion of the Company's mains and works. Your Company has, however, offset as far as possible the increasing costs in recent years by economies resulting from greater efficiency of our new or re-equipped pumping stations and the introduction of mechanisation leading to increased productivity.

Your Company continues to expand at the rate experienced in 1966, 4,155 new supplies being added in 1966. To finance the necessary main and other works during 1966, which cost £505,185, and in the forthcoming year, estimated at £6,000, an issue of £1,000,000 Redeemable Debenture Stock was made on October 24, 1966.

For many years the Minister of Housing and Local Government has limited the issue of Debentures by Statutory Water Companies to one-half the issued Preference and Ordinary Capital, but during 1966, after negotiations with the Water Companies Association, the Minister consented to increase this limit and made the Southeast Water Order, 1966, giving your Company powers to issue Debentures up to 75 per cent of the Share Capital. The Minister has intimated that he will give consideration to an even higher limit and an Extraordinary General Meeting is being called to consider this.

NEW WORKS

The new Oakwood Reservoir, costing approximately £185,000 and holding six million gallons, came into operation towards the end of the year.

The reconstruction of Thundersley Reservoir, which I mentioned last year, is making good progress and should come into operation in the early summer.

Vange Treatment Plant, brought into use during the year, is operating satisfactorily and is obtaining very good water obtained from Fobbing Boreholes which have been idle since the Langford Works came into operation in 1957. This very modernised small plant was constructed with a very high degree of automation and serves to show the lengths to which the Water Industry can go in saving labour. The design was largely that of our Engineer, Mr. H. W. Knight, and its operation is proving most satisfactory.

No very large trunk mains have been laid during the year. However, some twenty-two miles of distribution mains have been laid including five miles of renewals of old mains. Some of the Company's mains are over 100 years old and this relaying process will be a continuous and necessary operation for many years as the useful life of the mains diminishes.

DESALINATION

In conjunction with the Atomic Energy Authority, the Central Electricity Generating Board and the Water Resources Board the Company carried out an extensive investigation into the possibilities of siting a desalination plant of a substantial size in the Bradwell area for obtaining pure water from the sea. Costs, however, were found to be in the region of ten million pounds per annum delivered into the Company's distribution mains, chiefly due to the high cost of obtaining heat. It was therefore not economic to proceed, nevertheless, valuable technical information has been obtained. If in the future it is possible to halve these costs then it may be a worthwhile proposition, especially when all local sources have been fully developed.

ELY-OUSE SCHEME

During the year the Water Resources Board published the Study of Water Supplies in South-East England, and recommended that the transfer of water from the Ely-Ouse to the Essex Rivers should be fully investigated to provide the Company's future requirements.

The Essex River Authority is undertaking this investigation and negotiations are now in progress to ensure that adequate supplies are available to the Company from this source by 1971. In consequence, after consultation with the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and the Water Resources Board, the Company decided not to proceed with the construction of the Malden Reservoir at the present time.

The Company is proceeding with plans to reconstruct the Langford Treatment Plant, which will be so designed to increase the output initially from eight to twelve million gallons a day, with room for further extension should this prove advisable in the future to eighteen and twenty-four million a day. The Hanningfield Water Joint Managing Committee, in which your Company is an equal partner with the South Essex Waterworks Company, are also preparing to enlarge the Treatment Plant at Hanningfield, and a pilot plant is under construction.

POPULATION

In 1963 the Company agreed with the Essex County Planning Officer figures for population increases up to and including 1981 and the Company planned their future works programme on these figures. In the early part of 1966 it was found that increases in population in certain areas were ahead of the County Planning Officer's estimates, and had already passed the estimated figures for 1971 and even 1981 in one case. As major schemes require from five to seven years to complete, the Company is unable now to bring forward works to supply this greatly increased population before 1971. Therefore to ensure that adequate water supplies are available to all consumers, the County Planning Officer has had to recommend the curtailment of development in certain areas. It is no fault of the Company that we cannot guarantee to supply new developments which are so far in excess of the County Planning Officer's 1964 figures.

Towards the end of the year the Company learnt that the Metropolitan Water Board were proposing to the Minister of Housing and Local Government they should take over your Company together with the South Essex Waterworks Company and neighbouring local authority water undertakings. Up to the present time we have received no definite proposals, so it is difficult to make any comment. In the meantime your Directors are making arrangements as stated above to obtain future supplies of water from the Ely-Ouse as suggested by the Water Resources Board, rather than from the Metropolitan Water Board.

STAFF

My fellow Directors and I are greatly fortified by the knowledge that we are supported by a loyal and capable staff and I wish to take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of the splendid way in which they have served the Company in their various capacities throughout the year. The prestige enjoyed by your Company owes much to our staff, and I am confident that you would wish to be associated with this acknowledgement of their efforts.

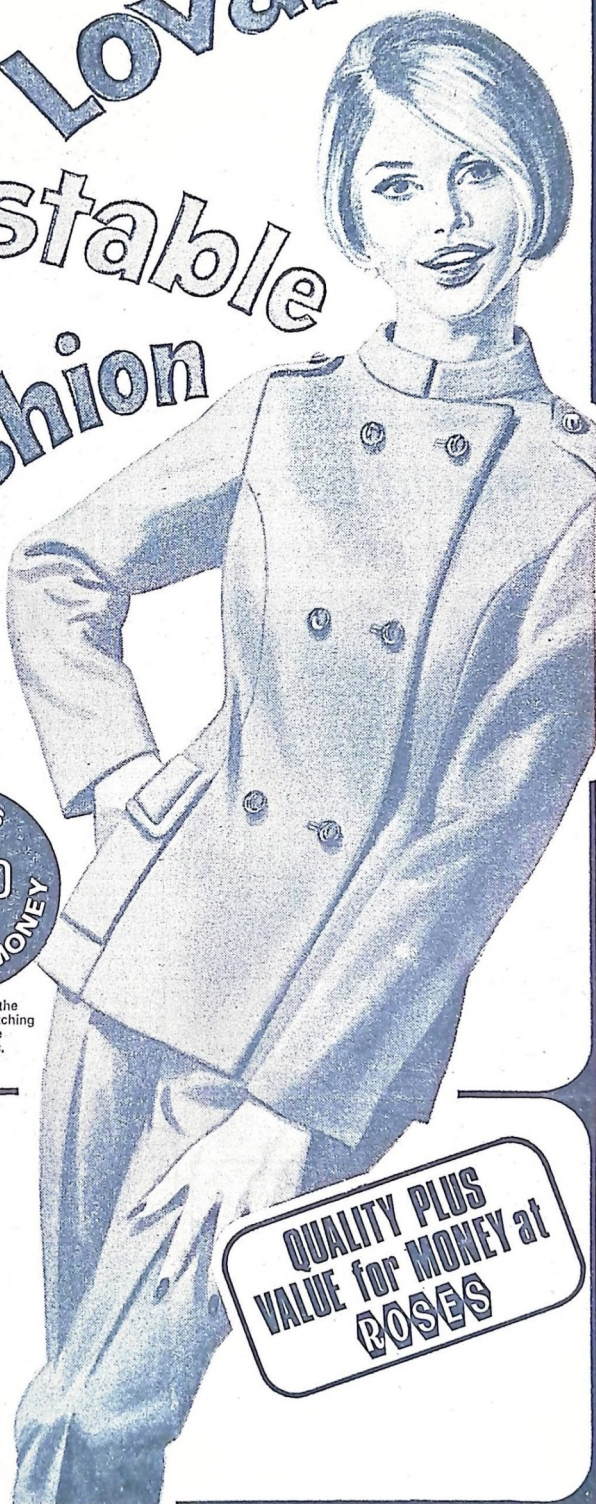

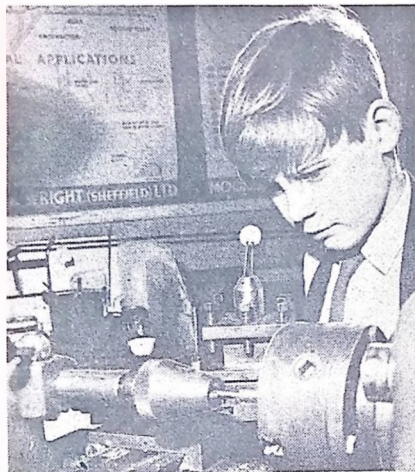

The needlework room is as well fitted as the school can make it: it has a fitting room, complete with full-length mirror, and a supply of hand and electric sewing machines. Girls are encouraged to study the latest fashion trends, and help each other with such tricky jobs as the turning up of hems.

"THE SCHOOL appears to have held always a good reputation in the area. Many local head teachers started their careers as assistant teachers at the school."

This extract from the staff handbook of Laindon Secondary Modern School gives an accurate picture, and since it was opened in May, 1928, with 239 children, the school has had reason to be proud of its successes and its good name.

It has weathered at least two major changes: from Laindon High Road Council Mixed School it became a secondary modern school under the 1944 Act. Now it faces the probability of becoming a 10-form entry comprehensive school under the Basildon scheme for re-organisation.

Deputy Head Mrs. D. Clark feels that it will be quite a relief when the scheme does come into operation.

Mrs. Woodard, in charge of the cookery class, teaches the children how to cook anything, from fish to bread. At Christmas they all made some beautiful cakes.

"Any interim period is bound to be difficult," she says. "We feel that we are living on top of a precipice at present. Of course, we are not alone—this applies to all the other secondary schools in Basildon."

At least the school can hope that some of their older buildings may be brought up to date. At present pupils have to go outside to get from one building to another for various activities. This, Mrs. Clark hopes, will be rectified.

The swimming pool, provided by contributions from parents, will be roofed and the gymnasium may get showers and changing rooms.

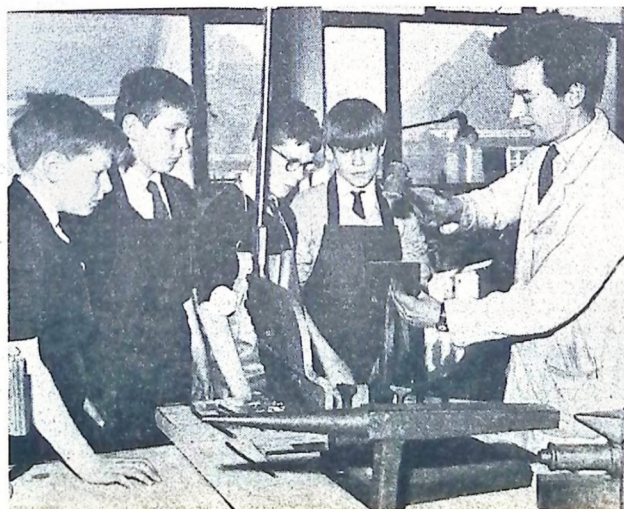

Easy gambling was cashier's downfall

Now he must not bet again

DEBTS WHICH accumulated because of his gambling losses brought about the downfall of a £1,400-a-year cashier at H.M. Stationery Office at Basildon, it was stated at Essex Quarter Sessions at Chelmsford on Wednesday.

Said to have hitherto borne a first-class character, Alexander Cordiner (51), of Dordells, Basildon, was put on probation for two years after pleading guilty to charges of falsification of accounts and one of stealing £50, the total deficiency being £895.

The Court made it a condition of his probation that he abstains from gambling of any kind.

Commenting on the fact that Cordiner had lost his gratuity of £1,369, the Deputy Chairman (Major S. H. Macdonald) said this was, in effect, a "fine" already imposed on him.

"You have done a grievously wrong thing," he told him, "but we think no real good would be served if we sent you to prison. Your most serious punishment is the finger of scorn pointed at you by your neighbours and those you worked with."

Earlier Cordiner told the Court: "I express my remorse for the shame I have brought on my family and for the betrayal of the service

to which I belonged for so many years."

SPOT CHECK

Mr. James Kilfedder, prosecuting, said when an auditor arrived to make a spot check at the Basildon branch of the Stationery Office Cordiner admitted discrepancies totalling £895 over a six-month period up to the early part of September last year.

He had taken sums of money from the petty cash account and falsified monthly returns to headquarters to cover up these deficiencies.

Det. Sgt. Edward Davison reported that Cordiner had spent 37 years in the Civil Service, in which he started as a telegram boy. During the Second World War he served in the Royal Artillery in which he became a sergeant, then returned to the Post Office and transferred to the Stationery Office in 1948.

In 1960 he was promoted to executive officer and transferred from the London office

to the Basildon branch where he became cashier in October, 1963, and responsible for paying the wages of a staff of 300. He was dismissed on the day the offences came to light and had since been unemployed.

Miss Nina Collins, defending, said Cordiner had lost his job, his gratuity and pension, and all because of gambling. He had always been a gambler, but until the opening of betting shops was able to keep things under control.

It was the ease of gambling through betting shops which proved his undoing. He got into debt, borrowed £200 from a merchant bank, was unable to repay and then started stealing to meet the debts which were piling up.

Miss Collins said Cordiner was resolved to repay as much of the money as possible. His wife and family, two sons and a daughter, were standing by him. The wife had taken a job and their elder son was making himself responsible for paying off the £200 debt.

At the time of his dismissal Cordiner was earning £1,400 a year, his work involving him handling a total of about £25,000 a month.

The Carnival accounts will be audited

BASILDON CARNIVAL Association still have no audited accounts for the last two years—despite a promise from Chairman Mr. Mick Willis at their annual meeting six weeks ago that they would definitely be issued within a month.

However, an accountant willing to tackle the job of auditing has at last been found and the books are with his firm at the moment.

The reason for the delay, Mr. Willis told an Association meeting on Wednesday, was the high cost of auditing. A firm wanted 15 guineas for each year's accounts—a total of 30 guineas, which must come from the non-existent Carnival bank balance. The books, say the firm, will take at least four weeks to sort out.

"And when it is all done," said Mr. Willis, "it won't tell us any more than our bank statement tells us now. But as far as I am concerned I feel like insisting that this company do the books so that everyone is in the clear."

The meeting agreed with him and finally Mr. George Coleman-Wood (Vice-Chairman) proposed that the firm's offer be accepted. The motion was passed unanimously.

Apart from the accounts, the meeting was mainly one of optimistic plans for this year's Carnival. They include:—

- A massive programme of selling effort, with the prize of a holiday for two in Majorca for the lucky programme winner.

- The possible purchase of a 30-cwt. lorry, which Treasurer Mr. R. Hellings and his wife have offered to buy till the Association can afford to pay them back.

- Bigger-than-ever plans for the gymkhana on August 26th, for which entries have already been received from as far away as Norfolk and Hertford.

- The offer of 30 free driving lessons from the Welham School of Motoring for the Carnival Queen.

Other news to come from the meeting concerned the Carnival Association Guild. The meeting decided to attend meetings of a break-away federation in Maldon and those of the Guild, but they also decided to withdraw their Queen from the Easter parade organised by the Guild.

LOST HIS APPEAL

PITSEA car dealer Mr. Frank Warr has lost his appeal to continue running Pitsea Auto Mart in Station Lane.

His appeal against Basildon Council's refusal was heard by a Ministry of Housing inspector in a two-day planning inquiry which ended in January.

Announcing their decision this week the Ministry describe the appeal site as "unsuitable for car sales, detracting from the character of the area and a traffic hazard."

Hardship might have been suffered by Mr. Warr if he had been deprived of the use of the site earlier, say the Ministry. But Mr. Warr now had an alternative site (Commodore Motors) and could continue his business there. There were no longer sufficient reasons why use of the site should be continued. It was likely to impede road improvements for the good of the public at large and conflict with development proposals.

At the inquiry Basildon Council denied operating a vendetta against Mr. Warr or a policy against secondhand car dealers in general.

MARKET NOTICE AN AID TO BURGLARS?

MARKET TRADER MR. JACK KERSTEIN TOLD BASILDON CHAMBER OF TRADE HOW HE COMPLIED WITH A BASILDON COUNCIL REQUEST. HE DISPLAYED HIS NAME AND ADDRESS PROMINENTLY OVER HIS STALL—AND PROMPTLY HAD HIS BUNGALOW HOME BURGLED! So the notice was taken down, Mr. Kerstein added on Tuesday. But now all traders at Basildon Market have been told by the Council that a new by-law means they must have a name board. "This increases the risk to a trader," he said.

The meeting decided to ask the Council to substitute stall registration numbers for the address requirement. Then customers would be able to find out the address of a trader through the Council Offices.

Mr. E. Orrock agreed all that was needed was sufficient identification to enable a letter to be sent to a market trader. But he stressed that, as the trader had no property to tie him to the town, there was a need for consumer protection.

Another member added: "Unless a reader wishes to disclose his private address, it should not be disclosed forcibly."

Also discussed at the meeting was a second by-law connected with the Food and Drugs Act, which requires individual washing facilities to be provided at each stall selling open foods. About six stalls are involved.

Less Party loyalty in periods between General Elections?

Mr. Moonman and protest votes

BY-ELECTION setbacks for Labour were called "a reflection of the normal protest vote between General Elections" by local M.P. Mr. Eric Moonman when he reported back to Party workers at Billericay. He told 60 Party members and trade unionists on Friday that people felt less loyal to the major national parties at such a time.

He considered the analysis given by Wedgwood Benn, Macleod and Lubbock when the results were announced on television as "very fair."

Nevertheless, he said, As a consequence of a Labour Party must feel the National Party conference resolution, a sub-committee of the National Executive had been studying the question of "industrial democracy," said Mr. Moonman, a member of the sub-committee. He forecast its report could have a big impact when it appeared later in the year.

He emphasised, however, that if trade unionists were to take an important role in the actual running of industry, then they would have to educate themselves to understand the very complicated matters they would have to discuss.

"Management must share responsibility with the Government and the unions," said Mr. Moonman, going on to criticise the British Motor Corporation for dismissing 12,000 workers last November, only to start recruiting 3,000 now. The company had not done its "homework" and planned ahead as it should have done, he said.

Wider movement

The incomes policy, Mr. Moonman stressed, was part of a much wider movement to improve the country's economy. He linked it with increased spending on scientific research and development, the creation of the Ministry of Technology to assist the exploitation of new ideas, and the problems into conditions of entry into the Common Market.

As to the next stage of the incomes policy, Mr. Moonman favoured the establishment of three guide lines. There should be no limit to pay increases which had a genuine counterpart in increased productivity. In other cases pay increases should be limited to a percentage basis. The third guide line involved preferential treatment for the lowest paid and for improved wages - salaries structures.

"There cannot be a realistic incomes policy unless the Government and the unions take the trouble to explain the criterion at all levels," said Mr. Moonman. He regretted the delay in setting up pay and productivity committees in all companies, and said that more information was required as to why prices were raised.

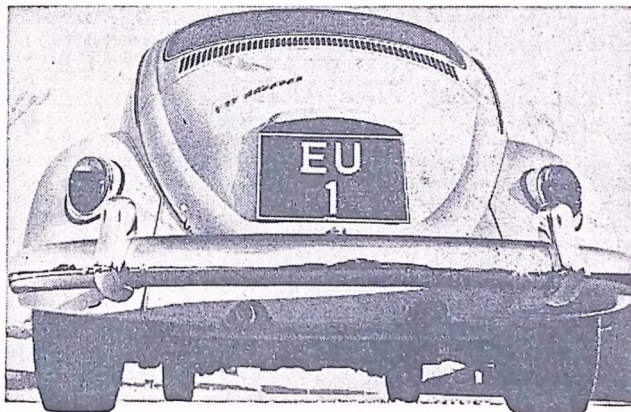

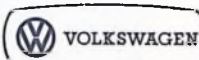

Billericay Primary School

Planners still oppose the Mayflower limit on admissions

BECAUSE of accommodation difficulties at the Mayflower County Secondary School, Billericay, admissions from outside the district under Basildon Council's Planning Committee for Education's control are to be limited to those children with brothers or sisters already at the school.

The School Welfare sub-committee came to this decision after considering a report on the increasing number of pupils attending the school and on the present accommodation position.

Members were told that the position would not improve until the proposed three-form entry extension secured a place in a building programme.

It was felt desirable to make some allowance for meeting, where possible, preference of parents outside the catchment area of the school, but within the extended district.

The sub-committee also decided to give consideration at their next meeting to a policy for admissions to Beauchamps Secondary School, Wickford, of children residing outside the extended district.

Bus driver fined for careless driving

WHEN A van stopped in Uppermaine, Basildon, a bus ran into the back of it and forced it up on the grass verge.

The result was that the bus driver, Roy Livermore, of Henry Road, Chelmsford, denied careless driving at Billericay on Tuesday.

He was fined £10 with £9 17s. 4d. costs.

Livermore said he saw the van ahead and the first thing he knew about it stopping was when the brake lights came on. There was no other signal given. "I applied my brakes," he hooted and swerved and hit a patch of snow in the road and skidded into him.

THE BATTLE between Basildon Council's Planning Committee and the County Education Committee over proposals to extend Billericay Primary School goes on.

The Planning Committee have in the past condemned the use of Green Belt land for school buildings, although they have suggested it could be used for playing fields.

They have also asked for proper vehicle parking facilities off the Laindon Road.

Now they have been told by the Education Committee of the difficulties of confining building to the existing site.

The County Architect has estimated the additional cost would be between £30,000 and £35,000 for foundation work because of the nature of the soil.

Then there would be the "prohibitive cost" of finding temporary accommodation for the children during rebuilding work.

The Planning Committee have also been told that the infants' school would be a one-storey building set well back from the road, and, by using the additional land, access and parking problems could be overcome.

They have decided that the County should be informed that while they still maintain their previous views, the decision on the proposed extension should be made by the County Planning Committee.

FIRE AFTER CAR CRASH

PETROL vapours which reached the ignition leads caused a fire when two cars collided on the Arterial Road, Rayleigh, on Saturday afternoon.

One of the cars, owned by Mr. Thomas Hart, of Hovefield Avenue, Basildon, was slightly damaged. Hadleigh Fire Brigade attended.

Because he let friend ride his moped

EDWARD RAYNOR, of Church Road, Ramsden Cellhouse, was fined £1 at Billericay on Tuesday for what the Chairman, Mr. A. S. A. Roth, described as "two very minor offences" of permitting a friend to ride his moped without insurance and a test certificate.

He admitted the offences, but the friend, Walter Arnold, of Hepworth Gardens, Barking, pleaded not guilty, claiming he was told the machine was fully covered for use on the road.

P.C. Roger Britton said he saw Arnold riding the moped in Church Road, and saw him stop near Raynor, who admitted being its owner and that it was not insured.

Raynor later admitted having no test certificate. The previous owner of the moped claimed it had been destroyed, he said.

Arnold said Raynor contacted him because he could not start the moped, which had been off the road for some time.

He told P.C. Lawrence Boniface: "I got on it and peddled it for about 50 yards to try to start it. I would never have got on it if I had realised I was doing something wrong."

He was found guilty and also fined £1.

Members felt this proved their doubts — made last July that the County Council had put up unsuitable fencing. So they will ask the County Education Committee to pay for repairs.

BINGO AT Wickford Community Association on Friday evenings will soon have the attraction of a weekly £35-plus jackpot. Amount of the bait will depend on the number of books sold at the sessions.

It will mean that players will no longer have to wait several weeks in the hope of winning the "snowball" prize.

"This added attraction should lead to an increased attendance, and there will be strict enforcement of the regulations, which allow a maximum of 300 in the main hall. Once this number has been reached no one will be admitted," an Association member told the "Standard."

The cost of each book of tickets will be 4s., with the

The new scheme will come into force when the present "snowball" has been won.

The jackpot will be the third game of each evening.

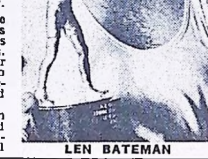
